



The Capitole

Havana, the capital of Cuba has also its Capitol since 1929. As its twin in Washington, the building has the purest neoclassic architectural style. The dimensions of the statues that are inside the building (like The Republic, the third biggest statue inside a building) represent the megalomania of dictator Machado that inaugurated it. The Capitol, which was the venue of the House of Representatives and the Senate until the triumph of the Revolution houses nowadays the Academy of Sciences, a museum that tells the story of the building and a panoramic bar from which you can have a wonderful view of the Central Park and the Big Theater of Havana.

Besides the big waiting hall (like the *salle des pas perdus* in Versailles.) where gala dinners can be organized by special request), the Capitol has 7 meeting rooms with air conditioning. We also use them for Salsa Courses.

The Revolution Museum

The building that houses today the Revolution Museum used to be the Presidential Palace, where dictator Batista escaped after a glass of champagne during the New Year's reception on December 31, 1958. The triumph of the Cuban Revolution was declared the following day!

Like in the Capitol, we use the halls of this building and particularly the big Reception hall that looks out over the terrace in front of the Havana Bay.
